**RESOLVED** that Parliament approve in accordance with section 5 of the Land Acquisition Act, Cap. 228, the compulsory acquisition by the Crown of the parcel of land situate at Constant, in the parish of Saint George, in this Island, more particularly described in the Schedule hereto for the purpose of housing development.

## **SCHEDULE**

ALL THAT land the property of Constant Estates Limited situate at Constant Plantation in the parish of Saint George, in this Island, containing by admeasurement 2.76 hectares or thereabout Abutting and Bounding to the north, on lands of the National Housing Corporation to the east and south on other lands of Constant Estates Limited and to the west on lands of the Crown or however else the same may abut and bound as shown and delineated on a plan certified on the 16th day of July, 2001, by Harrell G. Gaskin, Land Surveyor and recorded in the Lands and Surveys Department on the 5th day of October, 2001, as Plan No. 978/2001.

## **ADDENDUM**

The Cabinet on September 10, 1988 decided to approve the acquisition of 3.24 hectares of land at Constant in the parish of Saint George from Constant Estates Limited for the purposes of constructing a centre for vocational training. On the 8th of April, 1999 the Cabinet rescinded this decision, and decided instead to acquire 2.43 hectares of the land at Constant in the parish of Saint George from Constant Estates Limited for the purpose of housing development.

This latter decision by the Cabinet was rescinded on the 18th of November, 2004 and a new decision was made, by the Cabinet, to acquire a larger parcel of 2.76 hectares of land at Constant in the parish of Saint George from Constant Estates Limited for the purpose of housing development.

The approval of Parliament is now sought for the compulsory acquisition of the parcel of land described in the Schedule hereto for the purpose set out in the Resolution and that the Crown may acquire an indefeasible title to the said parcel of land.
